Project Rationale and Outcomes

This project will continue and further the key goals and objectives of the Australian Learning and Teaching Council (ALTC) following the disestablishment of the Council.

The proposal has arisen from a concern that the two partner organisations, the Australasian Council of Open, Distance and ELearning (ACODE) and the Australasian Society for Computers in Learning in Tertiary Education (asclite), share with other Australian organisations concerned with learning and teaching in higher education. ACODE and asclite believe that the networking capability, together with the support and promotion of University Learning and Teaching, that ALTC offers will be lost or at the very least significantly diminished with the disestablishment of the ALTC. Networking and promotion of learning and teaching have been a hallmark of ALTC's operation and we believe there is a need to continue this work.

ACODE and asclite as peak bodies in the Higher Education sector have representation in all Australian Universities in the domain of technology-enhanced learning and teaching. ACODE and asclite have also signed a Memorandum of Understanding which strengthens their collaborative partnership and this proposal. The two organisations are strongly positioned to advance a 'National Networking Initiative' by drawing on their knowledge, expertise, and relationships in the area of technology-enhanced learning and teaching to facilitate the establishment of positive and collaborative relationships among kindred organisations and institutions across Australia.

The project will be informed by the ALTC's guiding principles of: Excellence; Sustainability; Collaboration; Diversity; and Inclusiveness. The National Networking Initiative (NNI) will be established to continue ALTC's critical roles of; facilitating the sharing of best practice; promoting collaboration and collegiality; and continuing to engage academic staff in the wider sphere of the scholarship of learning and teaching. Underpinning the NNI will be a focus on the four objectives of the Innovation and Development Grants Programme of: transparency, value for money, high impact and future looking.

There are two major inter-related streams to the proposal, each predicated on the support and enhancement of the networking role that is reflected by the ALTC vision that "changing cultural practice is best achieved by developing connections within higher education – working with, and building on, existing networks to address national and disciplinary priorities in teaching and learning" (ALTC 2010 Annual Report, P.2).

The first stream involves disseminating, promoting, and enhancing the outcomes and practices arising from the many projects ALTC has funded e.g. those being reported on in the current Good Practice Projects. The value of such projects will continue to be enhanced through the NNI.

The second inter-related stream involves the development of a mechanism for 'kindred' organisations focussed on teaching and learning in higher education to work together to establish priorities for the dissemination and operationalisation of research, strategies, ideas and initiatives arising from the ALTC projects. Without such a mechanism, there is a likelihood that such projects will only inform practice within the lead institution and fail to be applied to a wider cross-section of institutions outside the lead institution. There is also a risk that resources on current websites will be underutilised.

Project Goals:

A key goal of the NNI will be to work collaboratively with the kindred organisations of ACODE and asclite, such as HERDSA, CADAD, and ODLAA, to enable a coordinated, collaborative, and integrated approach to enhancing and promoting the vision and goals established by ALTC.

A second goal is the dissemination of the outcomes of ALTC projects, fellowships and other initiatives through the NNI.

A sub goal within this broad goal will be to disseminate and build on the "Good Practice Reports" which ALTC has recently commissioned. An effective dissemination strategy is critical to enhancing the value of these syntheses as is facilitating opportunities to build on the outcomes of the projects reviewed.

A further NNI goal will be the establishment of collaborative relationships with the State-based Promoting Excellence Networks (PEN's) being funded by the ALTC in order to support, enhance and disseminate teaching and learning initiatives and good practice within States, and share outcomes and synergies nationally where appropriate.

A further sub goal of the NNI will be to maximise the opportunities for effective dissemination and adoption of innovations and good practices that have been generated by the national Promoting Excellence Initiative (PEI) to enable the sharing, and extension of PEI good practice across the sector.

Further goals will be developed to support and contribute to the dissemination, sharing and collaboration of the outcomes of other ALTC initiatives, where appropriate and relevant, arising from the Innovation and Development grants, Special Initiative grants, Strategic Priority grants etc.

Approach

A noted strength of the ALTC is its capacity to facilitate the establishment of positive and collaborative relationships between organisations involved in supporting and enhancing teaching and learning in higher education. This approach and philosophy is embraced by both ACODE and asdilito who are committed through their missions to further develop and expand their collaborative ethos. Given that there are a number of organisations that focus on enhancing teaching and learning, ACODE and asdilito through the NNI will initiate and host, as a key element and a starting point for this proposal, a meeting of the presidents of the 'kindred' organisations (i.e. CADAD, HERDSA, ODLAA) to be chaired preferably by the ALTC Director or nominee. At this meeting it is proposed to workshop and develop the operational details of a networking strategy to underpin and inform the National Networking Initiative (NNI). Such a strategy will have as its goal the development and enhancement of networking and collaborative activity supporting teaching and learning within the Australian University Sector.

An adjunct to this 'collaborative' objective is a proposal to establish relationships with Netspot¹ and AARNet² by inviting them to participate in the project. We see these relationships as being positive for all groups. The NNI will leverage off the capabilities of Netspot and AARNet to 'connect' institutions and organisations and to deliver support to ALL Australian Universities. In turn, Netspot and AARNet will be able to affirm and promote the value of their capabilities and technologies to institutions and the sector.

The second strand to the proposal will focus on the key ALTC initiatives as the basis for the operation of the NNI. The workplan encompassing projects to be focussed on will be prioritised by the NNI Board. However, as a first initiative it is proposed (as noted above) to disseminate and build on the current "Good Practice Reports" that ALTC has commissioned. Currently 11 Good Practice Reports are being developed as listed below:

1. Assuring graduate outcomes
2. Blended learning
3. Curriculum renewal
4. Supporting students' transition into higher education
5. Work-integrated learning
6. Assessment of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) students
7. Innovative Indigenous learning and teaching
8. Revitalising the academic workforce
9. Technology-enhanced learning and teaching
10. Clinical teaching
11. Support for international students

A second initiative will be focussed on supporting State-based initiatives such as the West Australian Networking and Dissemination event (WAND) and other activities such as the State-based Promoting Excellence Initiatives (PEI). We will also invite a representative from the State-based Promoting Excellence Networks to be involved. It is intended to engage immediately with these groups and consult with them on the type of support they need and how the NNI might contribute to their initiatives. Initially we see the NNI supporting the dissemination and the ongoing development of collaborative relationships and initiatives as being of significant value to the State-Based PEN's. In addition, we would offer similar support for those institutions and groups who have been involved in the National PEI initiatives.

Mechanisms

The NNI will incorporate a wide range of dissemination and support mechanisms and tools. Initially the project will explore the following communication and collaboration options with a view to establishing protocols and operational procedures available to all target groups:

- Face-to-face workshops in major centres
- Webinars
- Using and enhancing Video linkages
- Desktop conferencing
- Mini-conferences (Upto one for each major initiative)
- Regional events (face to face)
- Supporting collaborative initiatives between partners to disseminate project outcomes (collaborative events, shared outcomes, etc)
- Development of Networking Guidelines
- Other mechanisms will be added as the project evolves

Netspot is a long term supporter of asclite and other such organisations. The CEO of Netspot is a long time seconded member of the asclite Executive. AARNet and ACODE are currently working together on several fronts. At the upcoming ACODE workshop, AARNet will be hosting an innovative technology session. In addition, the organisations are currently collaborating, together with REANNZ (in NZ), Massey University and Charles Sturt University to share in the process of developing an MoU.
- DEEWR
No official approach has been made to DEEWR as yet, however, the project team will invite a DEEWR representative to participate as a Board member. The project would also establish clear and explicit lines of communication with DEEWR.

In particular, the dissemination strategies will be linked to the DEEWR web site which it is understood is being developed to support higher education learning and teaching.

The NNI project entity will negotiate MoU's/agreements with the above kindred organizations clearly identifying their involvement and commitment to delivering integrated and coordinated programmes and support initiatives. These will be focussed on disseminating ALTC project outcomes and embedding ALTC funded good practice initiatives and enhanced collaboration across the Australian higher education sector and to showcase and introduce new and innovative educational technologies in a pedagogically robust manner

The role and contribution of the collaborative partners is critical. It is important that they have ownership of the programmes being developed and not simply inherit a pre-ordained programme over which they have had no say. It is also important, however, that there be an operating framework established so that a clear plan of work providing direction and coherence is able to be established quickly. The NNI project proposes that the various collaborative groups (as mentioned elsewhere) identify ALTC projects of specific interest/relevance to them and for which they will then develop guidelines, business rules, support packages and implementation case studies to support and enable other groups to more easily implement the strategies and initiatives identified. These organisation-based projects will be supported by the NNI. This process is seen as iterative so that there is ongoing development and evolution of the project outcomes.

Operation

The NNI team is looking to develop an engagement matrix. This might look like the table below;

The engagement matrix will have a focus on levels of engagement with very well defined target groups.

The rationale underpinning the NNI project is informed by the combined ACODE/CADAD event at Macquarie University in March, 2011. This collaborative approach to sharing expertise, experience, and good practice was seen by ALTC as an effective model and it is the sort of approach that needs to be kept in clearly in mind. The NNI will identify and support similar collaborative initiatives by providing resources to collaborating organisations to support such initiatives. There would be a proviso that these are collaborative initiatives focusing on the priorities identified by specific organisations. NNI will support the dissemination of the outcomes.

Value/Need for Project

Values and Principles

The project will be underpinned by the ALTC Values of:

- Transparency
- Value for Money
- High Impact
- Future Looking

And the ALTC principles of:

- Inclusiveness
- Long Term Change
- Diversity
- Collaboration
- Excellence

The Project will also incorporate and reflect the relevant principles and values of the lead organisations, all of which include in their strategic missions, statements regarding collaboration and networking agendas.

Objectives

The objectives of the NNI reflect the extreme concern that the two partner organisations, ACODE and asdilite share with similar Australian organisations that the networking capability together with the support and promotion of University Learning and Teaching which has been the hallmark of ALTC's operation will be lost in the forthcoming changes.

The NNI will:

- Support and maintain the dissemination of the outcomes of ALTC projects, fellowships and other initiatives. i.e. this project is intended to continue and further these key outcomes of the ALTC.
- Develop an integrated network in higher education to disseminate:
 - Higher education good practice principles and strategies
 - Enhance collaboration between 'kindred' organisations.
- Integrate, support, and disseminate state-based initiatives e.g. PEN's
- Facilitate and enable kindred organisations such as; ACODE; asdilite; HERDSA, CADAD, and ODLAA to work together to achieve synergies that will arise from a collaborative, and integrated approach to enhancing and promoting the vision and goals established by ALTC.
- Support these 'kindred' organisations in meeting their objectives with respect to Teaching and Learning e.g. To facilitate the key elements of ALTC Goal 2 and Goal 5:
 - #2 "identifying, supporting and disseminating innovations in learning and teaching"
 - #5 "to enable reciprocal national and international arrangements for sharing and benchmarking learning and teaching processes"

APPENDIX 3: LETTERS OF INVITATION TO AND SUPPORT FROM KINDRED ORGANISATIONS

3A: GENERIC LETTER OF INVITATION SENT TO ODLAA, HERDSA AND CADAD

Dear President

I am writing on behalf of ACODE and ascilite with an invitation to to participate in a proposal to ALTC for a National Networking Initiative (NNI).

We are sorry about the late notice. This initiative is a bit 'last minute'.

Some time ago ACODE and ascilite submitted an expression of interest in establishing a National Networking Initiative and it was only in the last week or so that we have been invited to submit a full proposal. Both Mike Keppell (President of ascilite) and myself have been working since then to produce a draft which we could present to you with this invitation.

The background to this proposal is that both ACODE and ascilite were extremely concerned with the Government decision earlier this year to close the Australian Learning and Teaching Council. This we believe is a concern which your organization and its membership will also feel. It is our view that once ALTC closes, there is potential for a great loss of knowledge, expertise and momentum with respect to the enhancement of learning and teaching across Australia. From ACODE's and ascilite's perspective, our organisations are particularly concerned with the loss of the networking capability that ALTC has built up among institutions and organizations such as ours. The establishment of positive and collaborative relationships between organizations in the higher education sector has been a real strength of the ALTC.

As you will see from the attached draft, should the NNI proposal be funded, we propose that an initial meeting of the presidents of what we are terming 'kindred' organizations i.e. ACODE, ascilite, CADAD, HERDSA, and ODLAA together with a DEEWR representative be called and the meeting be chaired preferably by the ALTC Director or nominee. At that meeting it is proposed we workshop and develop the National Networking Initiative (NNI) strategy to maintain and enhance networking and collaborative activity that supports teaching and learning within the Australian University Sector.

We see the purpose of the NNI to continue ALTC's critical roles of; facilitating the sharing of best practice; promoting collaboration and collegiality; continuing to enhance the engagement of academic staff in the wider sphere of the scholarship of teaching and learning, enhancing student learning outcomes; and other critical initiatives currently supported and promoted by ALTC. The programme would be developed and overseen by a board/steering group comprising the group noted above i.e. the presidents of the involved organizations, a DEEWR representative and with perhaps the one or two ALTC Fellows.

ALTC has suggested that the project should be of 2 – 2.5 years duration and that we should apply for \$220,000. As our organizations are not able to hold funds, they would be held by Charles Sturt University and we are anticipating a letter of support from Professor Ross Chambers

We realize this is short notice and we are not asking for an unequivocal commitment to participation in the project. However we would appreciate an email indicating an interest in the project and agreement to participate in the workshop that will be called if funding is approved.

We will phone you tomorrow and try to answer any questions you may have.
